examples of theoretical approaches to problems and issues in communication disorders the first section includes a collection of chapters that outline some of the basic considerations and areas of cognition and language that underlie communication processing a second section explains and exemplifies some of the influential theories of psycholinguistic cognitive processing and the third section illustrates theoretical applications to clinical populations there is coverage of theories that have been either seminal or controversial in the research of communication disorders given the increasing multi cultural workload of many practitioners working with clinical populations chapters relating to bilingual populations are also included the volume book provides a single interdisciplinary source where researchers and students can access information on psycholinguistic and cognitive processing theories relevant to clinical populations a range of theories models and perspectives are provided the range of topics and issues illustrate the relevance of a dynamic interaction between theoretical and applied work and retains the complexity of psycholinguistic and cognitive theory for readers both researchers and graduate students whose primary interest is the field of communication disorders

a large body of knowledge has accumulated on the cognitive processes and brain mechanisms underlying language much of this knowledge has come from studies of indo european languages in particular english chinese spoken by one fifth of the world's population differs significantly from most indo european languages in its grammar its lexicon and its written and spoken forms features which have profound implications for the learning representation and processing of language this handbook first published in 2006 as the first in a three volume set on east asian psycholinguistics presents a discussion of the psycholinguistic study of chinese with contributions by over fifty leading scholars it covers topics in first and second language acquisition language processing and reading language disorders in children and adults and the relationships between language brain culture and cognition it will be invaluable to all scholars and students interested in the chinese language as well as cognitive psychologists linguists and neuroscientists

neurolinguistics is a young and highly interdisciplinary field with influences from psycholinguistics psychology aphasiology and cognitive neuroscience as well as other fields neurolinguistics like psycholinguistics covers aspects of language processing but unlike psycholinguistics it draws on data from patients with damage to language processing capacities or the use of modern neuroimaging technologies such as fmri tms or both the burgeoning interest in neurolinguistics reflects that

an understanding of the neural bases of this data can inform more biologically plausible models of the human capacity for language the oxford handbook of neurolinguistics provides concise overviews of this rapidly growing field and engages a broad audience with an interest in the neurobiology of language the chapters do not attempt to provide exhaustive coverage but rather present discussions of prominent questions posed by given topics the volume opens with essential methodological chapters section i methods covers the key techniques and technologies used to study the neurobiology of language today with chapters structured along the basic divisions of the field section ii addresses the neurobiology of language acquisition during healthy development and in response to challenges presented by congenital and acquired conditions section iii covers the many facets of our articulate brain or speech language pathology and the capacity for language production written spoken and signed questions regarding how the brain comprehends meaning including emotions at word and discourse levels are addressed in section iv finally section v reaches into broader territory characterizing and contextualizing the neurobiology of language with respect to more fundamental neuroanatomical mechanisms and general cognitive domains

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
